As an obstetrics nurse, Angie understands the challenges faced by medically fragile children and their families. Access to medical day care services can help parents of medically fragile children keep their jobs or continue schooling, while their children benefit from professional healthcare and educational assistance.

The First Lady's program will support the day care center with each pin sold for \$10 at the district meetings. If all of the limited edition pins are sold, the campaign will raise \$10,000 and, when the goal is met, the First Lady has pledged a matching gift to the program.
